

### A Word from the BES-Net Team

Dear Members of the Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services Network,

June has been busy with the Global Inception and Capacity Building Workshop held in Kribi, Cameroon, from 13-15 June 2017. This workshop was led by UN Environment World Conservation Monitoring Centre (WCMC) and represented a key milestone for the implementation of our project funded by the German International Climate Initiative (IKI). The project is implemented by WCMC, through the Sub-Global Assessment Network, and BES-Net and aims to develop capacity for undertaking national ecosystem assessments using the IPBES methodology. Participants from Cameroon, Colombia, Ethiopia and Viet Nam took part in the meeting. The discussion focused on the rational and process of undertaking national ecosystem assessments, tools and data for ecosystem assessments, and an initial scoping for assessments in each country. The ecosystem assessments will be undertaken over the upcoming three years and will include a national BES-Net Trialogue.

We are also happy to announce the expansion of the methodological area of Scenarios & Modelling for Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services on the BES-Net website, with the addition of a library of knowledge, and a list of international experts who agreed to respond to questions from users. The module has been developed in collaboration with the PBL Netherlands Environmental Agency, to whom we extend our special thanks. We hope that you will enjoy exploring this new module!

Finally, we are happy to welcome two new BES-Net partners: the Capacities for Biodiversity and Sustainable Development (CEBioS) Programme, and Panorama - Solutions for a Healthy Planet. The CEBioS programme is housed and executed at the Royal Belgian Institute of Natural Sciences (RBINS) in Brussels, and carries out capacity building for partners of the Belgian cooperation in the field of biodiversity

#### Did you know?

New research published in the **Environmental Research Letters** identifies statistically significant spatiotemporal trends of forest loss in Brazil, Indonesia and the Democratic Republic of Congo between the years 2000 and 2014. The results show that the "overall rate of forest loss in Brazil declined over the 14-year time period, spatiotemporal patterns of loss shifted, with forest loss significantly diminishing within some Amazonian states and intensifying within the cerrado biome. In Indonesia, forest loss intensified in Riau province in Sumatra and in Sukamara and West Kotawaringin regencies in Central Kalimantan. Substantial portions of West Kalimantan became new and statistically significant hot spots of forest loss in the years 2013 and 2014. Similarly, vast areas of DRC emerged as significant new hot spots of forest loss, with intensified loss radiating out from

conservation and sustainable management in relation to poverty eradication. Panorama is a partnership initiative, which documents and promotes replicable solutions across a range of conservation and sustainable development topics - their online platform has currently over 300 solutions varying from protected areas to ecosystem-based adaptation. We are happy about being partners with CEBioS and Panorama and looking forward to our cooperation in the future!

# Science - Policy - Practice Discussions: Insights from David Duthie

Sustaining development for sustainable development – resilience is the key

For many current biodiversity people, sustainable development goes back a long way and resilience thinking is the "new kid on the block." In fact, resilience thinking is as old as sustainable development thinking, both dating back to 1972, to the Stockholm Conference and C.S (Buzz) Holling's seminal review "Resilience and stability of ecological systems," respectively. Resilience thinking might have its origin as a "Buzz" (Holling) term, but as it becomes the new buzzword in sustainable development there is a danger of many thinking that resilience is more about stability than coping with change, a point recently made by Thomas Elmqvist of the Stockholm Resilience Centre in a recent letter in Nature. A couple of years ago, an article proposed that "resilience" should replace "sustainability" as a policy concept, an idea which has been strongly critiqued by William Rees (of ecological footprint fame). Sustainable development of our modern industrial economic systems may not be possible, but sustaining development as in the idea of doughnut economics, respecting both planetary and social boundaries, clearly is a desirable trajectory, which will require a healthy dose of correct resilience thinking. If you are about to become a resilience thinker, please read the recent free article in the Oxford Research Encyclopedia of Environmental Science by Carl Folke, another founding father of resilience thinking and co-founder of the Stockholm Resilience Centre.

#### BIOFIN's Africa Regional Workshop in Uganda Focused on Finance Solutions for Biodiversity



The Biodiversity Finance Initiative (BIOFIN) organized a regional workshop in Entebbe, Uganda, on 13th – 15th June. The workshop gathered representatives of governments, the United Nations, and technical experts across Africa to share knowledge and discuss new financial solutions for

biodiversity. In her opening speech, UNDP-GEF Executive Coordinator, Adriana Dinu said "The world 100 years ago was in a very different place...The Paris Agreement, the SDG's framework are our ray of hope – the era of implementation. Even though we have transgressed two planetary boundaries, there is still hope if we act

# 22<sup>nd</sup> Poverty Environment Partnership Meeting Focused on Investing in Natural Capital

The Poverty Environment Partnership (PEP) hosted its 22nd meeting in New York in June 2017. The concept of the meeting built on PEP's "Getting to Zero" paper and 2016-18 PEP Strategy. The meeting was co-hosted by the Governments of Austria and Finland, Korean International Cooperation Agency and the United Nations. The meeting aimed to share knowledge, develop partnerships and support country-level implementation in investing in natural capital. The main focus of the meeting was on natural capital mainstreaming and institutions, local solutions for scaling up natural capital and financing natural capital investments.
